

Welcome to the Summer edition of the PFS Newsletter for 2015. I sincerely hope you and your families had a rewarding and safe festive May this year be season. bigger and better than 2014. I also hope you have had a successful breeding season. My breeding season has been a little slow with only a few hatched babies and developing. From early observations the quality of the youngsters seems be improving which is the main purpose of each breeding season.

I am looking forward to 2015 with excitement and anticipation. I hope it will be a big year because along with our two great shows The ANPA National is coming to town. The National will be held at Penrith Panthers in July. This is the first National to be held in NSW since 2000, our Olympic year.

Make sure you attend and see some great birds that will be on display. You might make a greater effort and enter some of your birds as exhibits, and meet many fanciers from around Australia.

As we break up our breeding pairs this month, don't forget to prepare to vaccinate your birds again for the PMV 1 Virus.

We still receive notifications of Virus outbreaks around Sydney. Please do not think that it has been cured or has disappeared. Old birds that have already been vaccinated require 1 Booster shot this year. Your young birds require TWO Shots 1 month apart and 1 month before you exhibit them at a show.

Two new Rules have been introduced late last year to take effect with your new memberships or at our shows in 2015.

Rule 1. Any person who lives in NSW and wishes to exhibit their birds at our show MUST now become a MEMBER of our Club.

Rule 2. All members of our club who wish to be sent a Hard (Printed) Copy of our Newsletters and Show Schedules will be charged an Additional \$15 per year, added to their Annual Subscriptions. If we send you all our material electronically, your Annual Subscriptions will remain the same.

Please check these two new rules that will be posted on our Show schedules for 2015.

Congratulations to John Hanson who is the only Australian to be invited to the United States to Judge at their National Pageant Of Pigeons in California this year.



PFS SUBSCRIPTION RATES -

Over the years the PFS of NSW inc. have kept their rates as low as possible so that all fanciers can enjoy the sense of belonging to an organisation that represents their many and varied interests in the keeping of Fancy Pigeons. This is an ongoing problem as postal and printing costs continue to rise and can easily be covered by simply increasing subscription rates. Fortunately in this age of diversity particularly in the area of print media there are alternate of ways communication that have to be embraced to control costs.

The best example of this are letters that used to be hand written (or typed) and then posted. Emails have in many cases taken the place of the posted letter and newspapers have been pushed to the side by TV news that is instant and of course gives visual coverage.

Our current subscription rates would have to be doubled to cover the production and postage of the Newsletter and the two Show Schedules so we have taken the following steps to keep our current rates for all members the same.

PMV ALERT - "February 2015"



Dr Colin Walker B.Sc. B.V.Sc. M.A.C.V.S. (Avian health) Melbourne Bird Veterinary Clinic

Over the last 2 months but particularly the last 2 weeks a significant number of cases of PMV have been diagnosed at the Melbourne Bird Veterinary Clinic. Lofts containing infected birds have been located near Nagambie, Gippsland, Frankston and throughout the Melbourne metropolitan area

The usual sequence of events has been that concerned fanciers have contacted the clinic with either multiple sick or dying youngsters, an unwell bird has been selected and euthanized, multiple tissue samples have been collected during an autopsy and then forwarded to an avian pathologist (Professor David Phalen) for histopathology examination. This is a very thorough means of diagnosis. Apart from PMV, multiple cases of Circo virus and also Herpes virus as well as some cases of Adeno virus have been diagnosed. The number of viral cases prompted the following email from Professor Phalen last week. Professor Phalen is professor of avian medicine at the University of Sydney. With this and the other pigeon cases that you have sent me, particularly, in the past 2 weeks, a pattern is developing,

- 1, While less common or less obvious in past years, the pigeon Circovirus, this year, appears to be impacting multiple lofts and is likely to be resulting in immune suppression which may be making every infectious agent out there worse.
- 2, PPMV is obviously also circulating within many lofts. Either because of the change in the nature of the virus or concurrent infection with pigeon Circovirus, the nature of the PPMV lesions is changing. Splenic lesions are now much more severe, pancreatic lesions are also more consistently present and in this instance of this bird are extremely severe, and it appears that lymphoid tissue is more likely to be targeted including Kupffer cells, intestinal lymphoid tissue and bursa.

From what you have you have sent me, it might be a bit of a bad time for your pigeon folks in the coming weeks. Fanciers need to be aware that the character of PMV has changed. This is due to the factors mentioned by Dr Phalen above but also because many of the birds that are now exposed to PMV virus have some partial immunity. Partial immunity is most commonly seen in unvaccinated youngsters which have passively acquired some immunity through the egg or crop milk from their vaccinated parents and also in youngsters which have received only one vaccination. This partial immunity modifies the symptoms displayed by infected birds. Most infected birds simply become quiet and develop wet droppings. Some birds will develop twisted necks and have poor co-ordination. In most infected lofts less than 10% of birds will die and in one recently diagnosed loft no birds died. We now rarely see the high mortality rates, extreme thirst and profuse wet droppings of several years ago. In fact many of the fanciers who contact the clinic with birds that subsequently were diagnosed with PMV initially thought their birds had a Salmonella infection.

As the vaccine is cheap, safe, effective and readily available there is little reason for fanciers not to vaccinate their birds. Not vaccinating not only puts their own birds at risk but also those of fellow fanciers. All Victorian fanciers are strongly urged not to become complacent about PMV and to ensure that their birds are vaccinated. Not only because of the risk of PMV, but also because of the risk of introduction of other viruses fanciers should obviously only introduce youngsters from reliably healthy sources.





Flying Into the World of Fancy Pigeons at the 93rd Annual Grand National Pigeon Show

Some 7,844 pigeons gathered this weekend at the 93rd annual Grand National Pigeon Show, and not one was the average street bird.

Welcome to the world of fancy pigeons, a niche hobby held by thousands around the world -- including ex-boxer Mike Tyson -- dedicated to raising and preserving hundreds of breeds of pigeons unique characteristics with such curly feathers, trumpeting calls and distinct color markings.

"These birds are all hybrid flowers so to speak – they couldn't exist in the wild," Los Angeles Pigeon Club director Bob Nolan told ABC News. "If they are released in the wild or escape, they die, so that's why you never see any of these pigeons on the street. There are well over 500 breeds, and we're discovering new ones all the time."



The hobby of crossbreeding and raising pigeons for specific characteristics dates back thousands of years and spans Charles nations. Darwin crossbred fancy pigeons, documenting the work in his book, "On the Origin of Species," and Queen Victoria is said to have raised pigeons, a tradition the current Queen of England continues. Last weekend's three-day show in Ontario, Calif., organized by the LA Pigeon Club, drew hundreds of enthusiasts who traveled from 21 countries to view the over 200 breeds of birds and catch up with friends.

"Pigeon people are a minority to start with, so you and I can to go to a party and I can talk to you about politics and sports and current events, but I can't talk to you about pigeons on the same level," Nolan said. "So when I have a friend that can talk to me on that level, we bond.

There's a great friendship that develops among these people because there are so few of us in the total scheme of things."

Hobbyists fall into four categories: racing homers, whose birds race home for hundreds of miles; fanciers, who raise the pretty pigeons for show; tumblers, whose pigeons do somersaults in the air; and squabs, who raise pigeons for food. Birds can be as cheap as \$5 and as expensive as \$600,000 for one racing homer. Beyond hobby, the appeal of raising a pigeon runs deep, and fanciers liken it to raising a dog or cat.

"There are some that are very docile, some wild, some real friendly, some that will slap your hand. A fat one, a thin one, a curly one – anything you want you can find," Nolan said. "We're the best kept secret. Everybody knows what a cow, pig, horse looks like, but how many know what different pigeon breeds look like? We really have something here that's unique."

So unique, though, that the hobby is in danger of dying out as the clubs find it difficult to recruit younger members. "The joke made years ago was that they're flying rats, and that's the image we're trying to get over," Los Angeles Pigeon Club vice president and event organizer Fred Maenpa, 69, told ABC News. "When I was a kid, I couldn't wait to get home from school to take care of my birds. Now they come home and get on the computer."

With names like frillback, archangel, jacobin and more, the unique breeds are very different from the poor reputation street pigeons have gained.

"We're like evangelists; we're trying to recruit new fanciers because we don't want our hobby to die out. Each one of these breeds of pigeons were developed by people who love them and passed it on to the next generation," Nolan, 72, said. "If we don't get new people to follow up after us, all those hundreds of years of development will go extinct."
